### REGULAR SEASON CONCLUDES SATURDAY AT NIU

Regular-season competition wraps up for the West Virginia University men's soccer team at Northern Illinois on Saturday, November 5, at 8 p.m. ET at the NIU Soccer and Track & Field Complex.

Fans unable to cheer on the Mountaineers in person can watch a live video stream and follow live stats, which both can be found on WVUSports.com. Additional updates, news and notes will be available on social media by following and connecting with @WVUMensSoccer on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram.

Saturday concludes a regular-season-ending four match roadtrip for the Mountaineers (8-6-1, 1-3 Mid-American Conference), where they look to improve on a 3-1 road record and a 4-2 mark outside of Morgantown. WVU is coming off a 2-1 loss at Western Michigan a week ago, after beginning the roadtrip with a 3-1 win at No. 22 Akron and a 1-0 midweek win at Penn.

The Huskies (1-10-4, 0-3-1 MAC) enter the final game of the regular season with an 0-5-1 record at home. On a five match losing streak, NIU is looking for its first goal in six matches and its first conference win. Northern Illinois' lone win on the year came at Milwaukee, on September 21.

Junior midfielder Jad Arslan leads the team with four goals, while he is joined by senior forward Felix Angerer with a team-high-tying nine points. Freshman defender Sebastian Garcia-Herreros and junior midfielder Joey Piatczyc lead the team with four assists. Angerer has a team-best 28 shots and 17 shots on goal.

Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos, who has made 46 saves and recorded eight shutouts, is second in the MAC in goals-against average (0.716) and save percentage (.807). Additionally, Angerer's 1.21 shots on goal per game is third in the league.

## SCOUTING NORTHERN ILLINOIS

Northern Illinois enters the regular-season finale with a 1-10-4 record and an 0-3-1 mark in conference play. The Huskies, who are 0-5-1 at home, have lost five in a row after a scoreless draw at Western Michigan in the teams' Mid-American Conference opener. NIU's last goal came on Oct. 4, in a 1-1 draw to UIC.

Eric Luzzi is in his eighth season as head coach at NIU after being promoted from associate head coach in 2009. He owns a 56-69-16 record at NIU and is 83-117-25 in 12 seasons as a head coach.

### SERIES HISTORY VS. THE HUSKIES

West Virginia is 2-2-1 all-time against Northern Illinois and undefeated in the last five contests. After a pair of losses in 2012 in the teams' first season as conference foes, the Mountaineers earned a 4-0 win at home in 2013 before a 1-1 draw in DeKalb in 2014. Last year, West Virginia posted a 3-2 win at home in the regular-season finale.

## LAST TIME OUT: LOSS AT WMU

October 29 - Western Michigan 2, WVU 1

A goal and several more chances in the final 10 minutes was not enough in a 2-1 loss at Western Michigan on October 29.

On a windy afternoon, the Mountaineers trailed 2-0 after 16 minutes of play before senior defender Jack Elliott scored on a penalty kick in the 80th minute after a red card was shown to the WMU keeper. With Western Michigan down a player for the final 10:09, the Mountaineers put two shots on goal and another hit the post, but they could not find the equalizer.

## ELLIOTT EARNS ACADEMIC AWARD

For the third consecutive year, senior defender Jack Elliott was named to the 2016 CoSIDA Academic All-District 2 Men's Soccer Team on October 27. A Management Information Systems major with a 3.96 grade-point average, Elliott has started all 14 matches and logged a team-high 1,288 minutes on the pitch.

The honor is the latest in a long list of awards for the London native. The past two years, Elliott has been named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America Team while also being recognized as a Distinguished Scholar-Athlete by the Mid-American Conference and earned Academic All-MAC Team accolades. Additionally, he was named to the All-MAC Second Team in 2014 and has earned Academic All-Big 12 honors and has been named to the Garrett Ford Academic Honor Roll, the President's List and the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll throughout his career.

## WVU HONORED FOR ACADEMICS

For the ninth consecutive year, WVU earned the NSCAA Team Academic Award for its team grade point average, the National Soccer Coaches Association of America announced on October 6. With a 3.04 GPA, the Mountaineers were recognized as one of 315 men's teams to earn a 3.0 GPA or higher during the 2015-16 academic year. WVU is one of 221 schools to have both its men's and women's programs recognized, while a total of 892 teams (315 men, 577 women) were honored.

## ARSLAN MAC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Junior midfielder Jad Arslan was been named the Mid-American Conference Player of the Week on October 24 after scoring two goals, including the game-winner, in West Virginia's 3-1 upset victory at No. 22 Akron on October 22.

Arslan recorded his second multi-goal match of his career and earned his second career MAC Player of the Week accolade after also being recognized as a freshman in 2014.

Both of Arslan's goals at Akron came less than eight minutes apart, in the 63rd and 71st minutes. His first goal, which gave WVU a 2-0 lead, proved to be the game-winner, Arslan's second of the season. Along with his team-high two goals, he led the team with three shots, all on goal, as the Mountaineers handed Akron its first conference loss since 2014.

## STREAKING TO A SHUTOUT RECORD

West Virginia recorded seven consecutive shutouts, the longest streak in program history, from Aug. 28-Sept. 24. The previous record of six was set in 2007, when the squad totaled a team-record 13 shutouts. WVU's shutout streak lasted a school-record 758 minutes.

WVU has recorded eight clean sheets in 2016, the most in a single season since the Mountaineers had 10 shutouts in 2009.

Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos' eight shutouts is tied for No. 7 in program history for most shutouts in a season, while it is eighth for most shutouts in a career.

## SANTOS EARNS MAC HONOR

Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos was named the MAC Player of the Week on Sept. 27 after leading WVU to a school-record seven consecutive shutouts. It is his first career MAC weekly accolade and the first honoree for WVU this season.

Santos posted a pair of shutout wins last week. He made a career-best seven saves in WVU's 3-0 win against American on Sept. 20, holding AU scoreless for the first time this season. He followed with a four-save outing at UNCG on Sept. 24.

Following his award, Santos ranked No. 1 in the country in both save percentage (.923) and goals-against average (0.215). WVU also led the nation in shutout percentage (0.88).

## RECORD-SETTING DEFENSE

WVU has put together record-setting numbers defensively. In their upset win over No. 7 Georgetown on Aug. 26, the Mountaineers held the Hoyas to three shots, none on goal. The following match, on Sept. 3, WVU held Princeton to one shot and no shots on goal. Two matches later, WVU held UMBC to one shot in the double-overtime match.

The win over Princeton and draw to UMBC marked the first time in program history that WVU has held the opposition to just one shot in a contest. Georgetown and Princeton's zero shots on goal also ties a WVU record, set on seven previous occasions.

## FACING THE MINIMUM

The West Virginia defense has provided plenty of help to the WVU goalkeepers in Marlon LeBlanc's 11 seasons.

Opponents have averaged fewer than 12.5 shots per game every year of LeBlanc's tenure, and in seven of his first 10 seasons the opposition has averaged fewer than five shots on goal in a game.

This year's defense has been especially good. In WVU's win over No. 7 Georgetown on Aug. 28, the Mountaineer defense held the Hoyas to just three shots, none on goal. The following match, WVU held Princeton to just one shot, which was not on goal. It marked the eighth time in program history West Virginia allowed no shots on goal and the first time WVU allowed just one shot in a match.

## TWO OR MORE = VICTORY

Since Marlon LeBlanc's arrival in 2006, the Mountaineers are 64-9-4 when they have scored at least two goals in a game.

The first loss came to Akron in the second round of the 2010 NCAA tournament, while WVU also fell to Elon in 2012. While West Virginia suffered four defeats in 2014 and three in 2015 when it scored at least two goals, the first in 2014 came to No. 9 UC Irvine, 3-2, two of the seven came in overtime periods and four occurred away from home.

## LEBLANC HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Marlon LeBlanc won his 100th match as WVU head coach in West Virginia's 1-0 overtime victory over ETSU on Sept. 9. In his 11th season at the helm, he owns a 105-77-28 record with the Gold and Blue and is the second coach in WVU's 56-year history to eclipse the 100-win mark.

Additionally, with a 3-0 win over Penn State on Oct. 13, 2015, LeBlanc won his 100th career match. A 2000 PSU graduate, LeBlanc was an assistant coach at Penn State from 2001-05 and earned four wins as interim head coach in 2002. His career record is 109-80-28.

## MIDWEEK WIN AT PENN

October 25 - WVU 1, Penn 0

An early second-half goal by senior forward Felix Angerer led WVU to a 1-0 victory at Penn on October 25, on a chilly night in Philadelphia.

Angerer netted his third goal of the season at 51:20 while WVU's defense and junior goalkeeper Jose Santos produced its eighth clean sheet of the season.

Despite being out-shot 10-4 in the match, the WVU defense prevented Penn from having more than one great chance offensively. Santos made three saves, two in the first half, including a big save early in the match to keep it scoreless.

## UPSET IN AKRON

October 22 - WVU 3, No. 22 Akron 1

A goal by junior midfielder Joey Piatczyc just 39 seconds into the match and two second-half goals by junior midfielder Jad Arslan fueled West Virginia to a 3-1 upset victory at No. 22 Akron on October 22.

The Mountaineers scored in the opening minute and never looked back, as Arslan scored the eventual game-winner in the 63rd minute before adding an insurance goal less than eight minutes later. WVU handed the Zips their first conference loss since 2014.

Along with Piatczyc's second goal of the season and Arslan's team-leading third and fourth goals, junior goalkeeper Jose Santos made several big saves to contribute to the victory. Santos finished with five saves on the night.

WVU finished with 10 shots, seven on goal, while Akron had 19 shots, six on goal. Senior forward Felix Angerer recorded assists on the first two goals, and freshman defender Sebastian Garcia-Herreros notched an assist on the Mountaineers' first score. Akron's lone goal came in the 87th minute, off the foot of Brad Ruhaak.

## SENIOR NIGHT

October 15 - Buffalo 2, WVU 1

West Virginia closed its home season with a 2-1 loss to Buffalo on October 15. Senior defender Jack Elliott scored his first goal of the season in the 11th minute before UB answered three minutes later and took the lead in the 36th minute.

Elliott, who finished with a team-high three shots and one of WVU's four shots on goal, scored his fifth career goal at 10:24, and junior midfielder Joey Piatczyc earned the assist. Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos made six saves, all in the second half.

Before the match, WVU honored its senior class of Felix Angerer, Mike Desiderio, Christian Diaz, Jack Elliott and Trevor Moon.

## TOP-25 SHOWDOWN

October 10 - No. 1 Maryland 1, No. 22 WVU 0

No. 22 West Virginia out-shot No. 1 Maryland, but lost 1-0 in a top-25 matchup on October 10. It came in front of 2,019 fans, the fourth-largest crowd to see a men's match at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium and the largest since 2010.

The Mountaineers recorded 15 shots, eight on goal, and held the top-ranked and undefeated Terrapins to eight shots, just two on goal. Maryland's goal came in the 26th minute and UM extend its shutout streak to five straight games.

UM's eight shots marked a season-low, while the match was the second time Maryland was held to just two shots on goal. West Virginia's 16 shots tied a season high for a Terrapin opponent and WVU's eight shots on goal is the first time all season a UM opponent has sent more than five shots on net.

UM's Cody Niedermeier stopped all eight West Virginia shots. WVU junior goalkeeper Jose Santos had one save. Senior forward Felix Angerer led the Mountaineer offense with five shots, two on goal and junior midfielder Joey Piatczyc recorded four shots, three on goal.

## MAC SLATE BEGINS WITH TOUGH LOSS

October 7 - Bowling Green 1, No. 22 WVU 0

On a rainy night at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium, WVU suffered a 1-0 loss to Bowling Green in both teams' MAC opener.

The Mountaineers had 12 shots, three on goal, but were shut out for just the second time this season. The Falcons had eight shots, six on goal, and Pat Flynn scored in the 53rd minute.

Eight of WVU's 12 shots, and all three shots on goal, came in the second half. Similarly, BGSU recorded six second-half shots, with four of its five shots on goal coming in the final 45 minutes. Goalkeeper Jose Santos made five saves, while BGSU's Anthony Mwambia stopped all three shots he faced.

Offensively for the Mountaineers, senior forward Felix Angerer and sophomore midfielder Tucker Stephenson led the team with three shots. Stephenson had two shots on goal, with Angerer accounting for WVU's third shot on goal.

## STREAK SNAPPED

October 1 - Saint Mary's 2, No. 15 WVU 1 (OT)

West Virginia's shutout streak was snapped with a 2-1 overtime loss to Saint Mary's (Calif.) on Oct. 1. The Mountaineers saw their school-record shutout streak, and unbeaten streak, end at seven matches and more than 750 minutes.

After Saint Mary's scored in the 52nd minute, WVU answered with less than four minutes remaining. Junior midfielder Jad Arslan scored his second goal in as many games to even the score at 1-1 before SMC won it in the 96th minute.

Junior keeper Jose Santos allowed two goals, his first goals allowed since the first half of WVU's season-opening contest on Aug. 26. Arslan led the team with three shots, one on goal.

## RARE ROADTRIP, SAME RESULT

September 24 - No. 24 WVU 1, UNCG 0

WVU recorded its record-setting seventh consecutive shutout in a 1-0 victory at UNCG on September 24 in Greensboro, N.C. Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos made four saves and moved into a tie for No. 9 in program history with his seventh career shutout.

Junior midfielder Jad Arslan scored the game-winning goal in the 62nd minute, his first goal of the season and second game-winning goal of his career. Freshman defender Sebastian Garcia-Herreros and freshman defender Steven James earned assists. West Virginia improved to 4-0 in 1-0 contests and a perfect 6-0 when scoring at least one goal.

WVU had 11 shots, with Garcia-Herreros leading the team with three. The Mountaineers notched four shots on goal. UNCG recorded 10 shots, four on goal.

## WIN CAPS HOMESTAND

September 20 - No. 24 WVU 3, American 0

For the sixth consecutive match, West Virginia shut out its opponent with a 3-0 victory over American on September 20. The Mountaineers remain unbeaten in their last six matches, outscoring the opposition 9-0 and going 4-0-1 on a five-match homestand. The Eagles were held scoreless for the first time this season despite recording 17 shots, seven on goal.

Junior goalkeeper Jose Santos notched his sixth shutout of the season, making a career-high seven saves. He extended his shutout streak to more than 615 minutes.

As good as Santos and the defense was, the offense was just as good. WVU scored three goals for the second consecutive match, totaling 10 shots, seven on goal. Senior forward Felix Angerer gave the Mountaineers an early 1-0 lead 11 minutes into the match for his second goal of the season. A minute into the second half, sophomore forward Rushawn Lammond netted his first goal of the year to increase the WVU advantage to 2-0. Just over seven minutes later, senior midfielder Griffin Libhart scored his first career goal, a highlight-reel play to put West Virginia ahead, 3-0.

## OFFENSE BREAKS OUT VS. MASON

September 17 - No. 23 WVU 3, George Mason 0

West Virginia scored early and late and held its opponent scoreless for the fifth consecutive match to beat George Mason 3-0 on September 17. The Mountaineers extended their shutout streak to five matches and more than 525 minutes as junior Jose Santos turned in his fifth shutout.

Freshman Albert Andres-Llop scored his first career goal in the sixth minute to put the Mountaineers ahead, 1-0. WVU added to its lead with another quick strike to begin the second half, courtesy of senior Felix Angerer in the 50th minute. With just over two minutes remaining, junior Joey Piatczyc sealed the win with his first goal of the season.

WVU held a 21-12 advantage in shots and a 12-3 edge in shots on goal. Sixteen of WVU's shots came in a strong second half, with eight on goal. Santos made three saves, while George Mason keeper Steffen Kraus stopped nine shots.

## THREE IN A ROW WITH OT WINNER

September 9 - No. 22 WVU 1, ETSU 0 (OT)

WVU won its third consecutive match on Sept. 9, as freshman defender Logan Lucas scored the overtime winner in the 100th minute in a 1-0 victory over ETSU. Lucas' golden goal was his first goal of his collegiate career, and he was assisted by junior Joey Piatczyc off a free kick and junior Steven James.

In goal, junior Jose Santos notched his third consecutive shutout and made a career-best four saves. WVU held an 18-12 edge in shots and an 8-4 advantage in shots on goal.

## HOME SEASON STARTS WITH WIN

September 3 - No. 24 WVU 1, Princeton 0

West Virginia held Princeton to just one shot on its way to a 1-0 victory on September 3. Tucker Stephenson netted his second goal in as many matches and the defense put up record-tying numbers to lead WVU to its second consecutive win.

WVU held the Tigers to one shot in the match and no shots on goal. It marked the first time in program history that WVU has held the opposition to just one shot in a contest. Princeton's zero shots on goal also ties a WVU record, set on seven previous occasions, including in August 28's upset win over No. 7 Georgetown.

Stephenson's goal came in the 43rd minute on a set piece. A free kick was awarded to the Mountaineers about 30 yards out on the left side. Junior midfielder Joey Piatczyc sent the kick into the box, directly to Stephenson who headed it in.

## 2016 BEGINS WITH AN UPSET

August 28 - WVU 1, No. 7 Georgetown 0

WVU opened the season at the Akron Classic in Akron, Ohio. After falling to No. 9 Seattle in the season opener, West Virginia earned a 1-0 upset victory over No. 7 Georgetown on Sunday.

It was the highest-ranked team West Virginia had beaten since taking down No. 1 UConn at home in 2011. The win was WVU's first against a top-10 foe since the Mountaineers won at No. 8 Indiana in 2013 and the first neutral-site ranked win since 2011 against No. 11 Virginia.

Sophomore midfielder Tucker Stephenson scored in the 81st minute to break a scoreless tie after the Mountaineers played right with the Hoyas for the first 80 minutes. Junior defender Louis Thomas and freshman defender Sebastian Garcia-Herreros recording assists. It was Stephenson's third career goal, all game-winning tallies, while it was the first assist of Garcia-Herreros' collegiate career.

The Mountaineer defense held the Hoyas to just three shots, none on goal. It marked the seventh time in program history West Virginia allowed no shots on goal and the 20th time an opposing team had three or fewer shots against WVU.

Stephenson, along with senior defender Jack Elliott and junior midfielder Jad Arslan were named to the Akron Classic All-Tournament Team.



## WVU VOTED THIRD IN MAC POLL

In a vote among the league's coaches, WVU was picked to finish third in the Mid-American Conference Preseason Poll. Akron was voted to win the league, with 29 points and five first-place votes, while Western Michigan was second.

## SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN

The Mountaineers annually have one of the toughest schedules in the country, and this season's 16-match slate proves to be no different.

WVU will face four teams that made the NCAA Tournament last season, with all four advancing to the NCAA Tournament Third Round or later.

Four of WVU's 2016 opponents are ranked in the NSCAA preseason poll, all in the top 15. The matches against ranked foes begin with the season-opening weekend against No. 14 Seattle and No. 10 Georgetown, in Akron, Ohio. At home, the Mountaineers will play No. 2 Akron and No. 4 Maryland.

"We've certainly been known year in and year out to play one of the best non-conference schedules in the country, and this is no different than any other year," LeBlanc said. "Our players came here to play in big games and big moments. We could schedule differently, but at the end of the day, these kids want to play in big matches. Having Georgetown on the schedule, having Maryland come to Morgantown as a national champion contender, those are big ones. Our game is littered with top-level opponents and we're certainly looking forward to the challenge that that's going to bring."

A total of nine regular-season matches will be played at home, accounting for nearly 60 percent of WVU's matches. The home slate features five- and four-match homestands.

"We have a string of a number of games that are going to be here in Morgantown," LeBlanc said. "Over the last decade, we've elevated the program in the community and in our campus as being one of the teams that our fans love to come out and watch. We draw big crowds, and we have fantastic support from the Mountaineer Maniacs and the community. For me, it's been a wonderful evolution to see how much soccer has grown in West Virginia and how much support our kids get. Without a doubt, Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium is one of the toughest places to come in and get a result, and we're glad that we get to have that advantage here at home."

## SEASON PREVIEW

The West Virginia University men's soccer team is hungry.

Hungry to improve upon a 7-12 season a year ago. Hungry to get back to its winning ways and be on the right side of the win-loss column.

It's a team with a unique mix of 15 returning players, many who were major contributors last season, and 14 newcomers.

As coach Marlon LeBlanc begins his 11th season at the helm, he is looking forward to seeing the continued development of the 15 veterans, and is equally excited for what the newcomers bring to Morgantown.

"We had such a big senior class last year, but what we're returning is a lot of players who contributed quite a few minutes. Yes, we're going to be young this year, but all those returners were major players on our team last year, so the cabinet is not empty.

"We have a hungry group that was disappointed with the results we had last year. This group understands that we didn't play poorly last year. Our record wasn't indicative of the type of team we were. We had some massive errors in big games that cost us results. You can end up on the right side or the wrong side, and last year we ended up on the wrong side too often. Because of that, this is a hungry group that is certainly very inspired heading into the season."

The returning players are headlined by junior Joey Piatczyc, who finished No. 2 in the country last year with a school-record 13 assists; senior Jack Elliott, who was an Academic All-American a year ago; and sophomore Tucker Stephenson, who had a breakout freshman campaign. That list also includes seniors Felix Angerer, Mike Desiderio and Christian Diaz and junior Louis Thomas, who played key minutes last year.

### FORWARDS

While West Virginia is tasked with replacing its top two goal scorers from a year ago in Jamie Merriam and Ryan Cain, WVU had a productive spring scoring goals.

LeBlanc and the Mountaineers have options to replace the departing duo, who accounted for 13 of WVU's 32 goals in 2015.

"Up front, we have to replace Jamie Merriam and Ryan Cain," LeBlanc said. "They provided quite a bit of offense for us. This spring though, we scored quite a few goals, and that often came through Felix Angerer. He had a wonderful spring season after trying to get himself acclimated in the fall. I certainly think we have found a target center-forward who can score goals at this level and score quite a few of them. We're very excited about Felix up there."

Angerer, a senior from Bayreuth, Germany, scored two goals and added a pair of assists in 15 matches last year. He'll be joined by sophomore Rushawn Larmond, who found the back of the net three times in 12 matches in 2015.

"Rushawn Larmond returns for his sophomore year after scoring a few times as a freshman," LeBlanc added. "He missed quite a bit of the spring, but he's back at full strength and will be another player, along with Felix, who gives us the option to play as a single forward or as a pair. Rushawn provides a great amount of speed up front and is clinical in front of the goal."

"Those two are the leading returning candidates, and with a few young guys coming in, we certainly think we have some ability to score goals. Scoring hasn't been our problem. We've been a pretty high goal-scoring team the past few years. We anticipate we have enough attacking weapons to do the same this year."

Angerer and Larmond could be joined up front by juniors Jad Arslan and Heath Honold and freshman Kyle Davis.

### MIDFIELDERS

The midfield is headlined by Piatczyc. The Lee's Summit, Missouri, native has his name plastered throughout the record books after posting a WVU-record 13 assists as a sophomore.

Piatczyc's total ranked No. 2 in the country and was highlighted by a school-record, four-assist match against San Francisco on Aug. 30. He had two multi-assist matches, and six of his 13 assists resulted in game-winning goals, also a school record. His 17 points were best on the team.

Piatczyc is one of 14 midfielders on the roster, nine of them returners.

"Most of the midfield is back, and that's the crux, including the top play-maker in the country last year in Joey Piatczyc," LeBlanc said. "He's the guy who's the provider and makes things tick for us in the attack. We'll lean on our captain to do the damage from midfield again there."

Another key returner is sophomore Tucker Stephenson, who played in all 19 matches and registered two goals and three assists as a freshman to tie for fourth on the team with seven points.

"Tucker Stephenson is back in the midfield after playing quite a few minutes as a freshman last year," LeBlanc said. "Jad Arslan returns for his junior year, Heath Honold is back. Mike Desiderio and Christian Diaz are seniors. We've got some very good players coming back, and we think that bodes well for us in terms of experience in our system and how we want to play."

Arslan played in 17 contests and had two goals and two assists as a sophomore, while Honold played in 14 matches with three assists, also as a sophomore. Desiderio, who had two goals and three assists, and Diaz, with one assist, return for their final seasons in the Gold and Blue.

The newcomers feature Antonio Bachmann, Lucca Barbaris, Ben Boone, Jake Coale and Ethan Shim.

"Again, I think we've added some very nice pieces into that midfield who are going to make it very difficult to zero in on any one player," LeBlanc said. "Going forward, we can score goals and attack in numbers. We anticipate that midfield and front line will be able to do the same in 2016."

### DEFENSE

Senior Jack Elliott and junior Louis Thomas anchor the defensive core for the Mountaineers in 2016. They are two of 11 defenders on the team, along with fellow returners and seniors Griffin Libhart and Trevor Moon, and Zion Gray.

"The defending is something that statistically, we were pretty good at last year, limiting shots and shots on goal," LeBlanc said. "The problem is we conceded far too many goals. We look at that as a team-wide thing. We expect our midfielders to help our defenders even more, and we need our defenders to shut down our opponents and limit shots even more than we did last year."

"Louis Thomas is back in the back four. Jack Elliott is back. We brought in a great addition in Albert Andres-Llop from Vila-Real, Spain, who spent the entire spring semester with us, so he has that under his belt already. He's joined by one of the top Division II players, an All-American in Steven James, who led Louisburg College to the Division II national championship.

"Our young players also include Ryan Kellogg, who was Sporting KC's Young Player of the Year, Logan Lucas, who was on that same Sporting KC team and Zion Gray, who had a fantastic spring in the back. We've got some very good, seasoned players. Trevor Moon will be a senior who's got some experience. We like the makeup of our back four. We like the options that we have to shuffle things around there."

### GOALKEEPERS

Three players are fighting for the starting goalkeeper position, two after redshirting in their first year at WVU in 2015 and one newcomer. The returners are redshirt junior Stephen Banick and redshirt freshman Konrad Dziedzic, while junior Jose Santos comes to WVU after transferring from Tyler Community College.

Santos was the starting goalkeeper on Tyler's team last year that advanced to the NJCAA finals.

"The goalkeeping, we've had some hiccups there the last couple of seasons," LeBlanc said. "We have three new guys battling for time in there this season. Two of those players redshirted last season, Stephen Banick and Konrad Dziedzic. They're back and vying for the No. 1 spot, along with freshman Jose Santos. We're looking forward to that competition for those three to really battle it out for the No. 1 shirt. If we can do a good job in the goal, the sky's the limit for that group, and this team."
